Navajo County Arizona(Primary)	On March 24 2015, the Board of Supervisors of Navajo County Arizona met in Holbrook Arizona. During the Board meeting, County Supervisors considered approval of the Tentatively Selected Plan for the Little Colorado River at Winslow Study, and approval for Navajo County staff to work with the City of Winslow on sharing project implementation costs. Then Public Works Director Homero Vela discussed the item. Supervisor Thompson made a motion to approve the Tentatively Selected Plan for the Little Colorado River at Winslow Study, and, approval for staff to work with the City of Winslow on sharing future project costs; motion seconded by Supervisor Nez. The Vote was unanimous approving the motion. Supervisor Nez expressed his appreciation to the Tomhave Group, the Public Works team, Homero Vela, Assistant County Manager and Supervisor Thompson for their work on the Winslow Levee project.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The purpose of the proposed action is to implement structural and/or nonstructural measures within the LCR, adjacent levees, and the adjacent flood plain from the eastern end of the Ruby Wash Diversion Levee approximately four miles downstream to reduce damages caused by flooding in the City of Winslow and the surrounding area. A related purpose is to reduce the risks to life, safety, and health caused by this flooding.

STATEMENT OF NEED

The Winslow Levee is an approximately 7.2-mile long structure. Its upstream terminus is located approximately 0.2 of a mile-southwest of the BNSF Railroad Bridge where it ties into the Ruby Wash Diversion Levee. The downstream terminus is located approximately seven river miles downstream. The Winslow Levee was constructed between 1986 and 1989 by the Arizona Department of Water Resources to contain the 100-year flood, equivalent to an approximate flow rate of 65,000 cubic feet per second (cfs). On January 8, 1993, a flood event with an estimated peak discharge between 57,000 cfs and 75,000 cfs overtopped the levee. As a result, a 3,000 foot section of levee was damaged, including a 400 foot section that was washed out entirely. Properties were flooded in Ames Acres, Bushman Acres, and other areas behind the levee. Of the 204 structures inundated by this event, 140 of them sustained substantial damages. On December 31, 2003, the levee experienced a piping failure. A levee failure, similar to the one experienced in 1993 would be even more damaging today, as it would threaten additional structures, including the City of Winslow Waste Water Treatment Plant. The primary flood-related problems in the study area are the potential for loss of life and property due to flooding and repeated failure of the Winslow Levee.

6. To the extent practicable, describe the anticipated monetary and nonmonetary benefits of the proposal including benefits to the protection of human life and property; improvement to transportation; the national economy; the environment; or the national security interests of the United States.

The City of Winslow Arizona experiences periodic flood damages due to inundation resulting from the overtopping and failure of the Winslow Levee. Residential structures account for \$135 million in structure value. Commercial and public structures are valued at just over \$163 million. The total value of structures and contents in the floodplain are \$461 million. Total without project expected annual flood damages are estimated to be \$10,230,000. 75% of these damages, approximately \$7,693,000 are attributable to structure and structure content damages. Implementation of the Tentatively Selected Plan (TSP) is expected to reduce these damages by 82 percent. The TSP has a 90 percent chance of containing the 1 percent annual chance of exceedence (100 - year) flood. The non-Federal Sponsor has requested the selection of Alternative 10.1 as the TSP. This alternative: 1) provides the non-Federal Sponsor's desired maximum level of protection; 2) has with-project residual risks that are not unreasonably high; 3) features levee improvements designed to meet FEMA's flood insurance requirements; 4) has greater net benefits than smaller scale plans; and 5) does not contain uneconomical increments. Annual Net Benefits for the TSP are estimated at \$5.3 million while the benefit to cost ratio is 2.75. The Regional Economic Development (RED) analysis shows that the TSP would generate about 1,115 jobs, over \$28 million in labor income, and about \$32.8 million in value added to the regional economy during the construction period. Other Social Effects (OSE) analyses show that the TSP would generate moderate to strong positive social impacts across most of the key categories evaluated, most notably life and safety. These key categories include: Public Health and Safety, Economic Vitality, Community Cohesion, Identity, Social Vulnerability, and Resiliency.

On March 24 2015, the Board of Supervisors (BOS) of Navajo County Arizona met and approved the Tentatively Selected Plan for the Little Colorado River at Winslow Study, and approval for Navajo County staff to work with the City of Winslow on sharing future project implementation costs. On March 24 2015, then County Public Works Director Homero Vela met with the Winslow City Council to explain the Navajo County BOS vote, and the Winslow City Council recognized a need to contribute to Navajo County a portion of the Non-Federal share of the project. Annual funds in the amount of \$500,000 have been incorporated into the Winslow City Capital Improvements Program (CIP) for the levee project.

NAVAJO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' MINUTES
Tuesday, March 24, 2015

PRESENT: Jonathan M. Nez, Supervisor; Jesse Thompson, Supervisor; Jason E. Whiting, Supervisor; Steve Williams, Supervisor; and Dawnafe Whitesinger, Chairwoman were present.

9:01 a.m. Call To Order: Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation led by **Supervisor Whiting**.

CALL TO THE PUBLIC: Mariclare Hannah from Taylor, AZ. appeared as a private citizen, even though she has previously gone before the Board as a Legal Defender. Ms. Hannah addressed the Board regarding the Jail policy change for visitation. She indicated this visitation policy change has become a hardship to the inmates, their families and friends. Ms. Hannah indicated that visits are through a visitation monitor which costs about a \$1.00 a minute for video visitation. She indicated that a one hour visit would cost approximately \$60.00. She stated the only free way for the inmates and families to communicate is by letter. She stated that many inmates are indigents and that the new policy impacts the poorest population in our county. Ms. Hannah asked the Board to study this issue and consider the effect this policy change has on the inmates, their families and friends. She stated the moral and ethical considerations in this case are more important than any financial gain. She stated that there needs to be other cost effective ways to deal with this. **Chairwoman Whitesinger** thanked Ms. Hannah for the information and bringing this issue to the Board's attention.

He reported he attended Small Counties and the CSA Board of Directors meetings, where discussion was held regarding the issues that are relevant for all of the counties, especially the impacts of the budget. **Supervisor Williams** indicated the senior staff; Melissa Buckley, Sheila Malone, Debra Chapman, James Jayne, Homero Vela, James Menlove, Lynda Young, Lupita Banuelos are very efficient and effective in their duties. **Supervisor Thompson** reported on meetings in Washington D.C. regarding discussions to encourage our legislators to reinstate the HURF funds. He indicated he spoke to the Federal Transportation Committee which allocates funds for the Navajo Nation to improve the roads for school bus routes and asked them to include this in MAP 21. **Supervisor Thompson** indicated there is a need to push for funding to assist in repairing the unsafe road conditions that need to be improved. He stated he had the opportunity to meet with the Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona regarding the improvement of the roads on the Indian Nation and hopes to present this issue to the Navajo Nation's Transportation Committee. **Supervisor Whiting** gave a report on the Superintendent of Schools meeting, regarding having a unified voice in speaking with our Legislators, and he thanked Homero Vela for his support in that meeting. **Supervisor Whiting** spoke about NovoStar, the new lumber yard which will start construction the first part of April. He expressed appreciation to James Menlove and the finance team for their strategic efforts regarding the Apache Railway in finding long term financing. **Supervisor Whiting** reported on the Snowflake-Taylor Chamber of Commerce Awards Banquet. He thanked James Jayne, Brad Carlyon and his wife, Sheriff Clark and his wife for their support in attending the banquet. **Supervisor Whiting** indicated he attended the Joseph City Founder's Day BBQ & Fundraiser. He expressed appreciation to **Chairwoman Whitesinger** for accompanying him on the City4TV's Navajo County Connections talk show. **Supervisor Nez** thanked Homero Vela and the Public Works team for their work during the state of Emergency in District I, from the snowfall and rain. **Supervisor Nez** spoke of the success of the graveling project for the Navajo Nation roads. **Supervisor Nez** reported that the Navajo Nation Presidential Election will be held on April 21. He thanked Melissa Buckley and those that were involved in recognizing the Vietnam Veterans and indicated that "every day is Veteran's Day." Homero Vela, Assistant County Manager reported on a meeting with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers regarding the Winslow Levee. Brigadier General Mark Toy and Colonel Kimberly M. Colloton, PMP will be in attendance on April 14th for a two hour Winslow Levee meeting. **Chairwoman Whitesinger** thanked everyone who represents the county and for all they do.

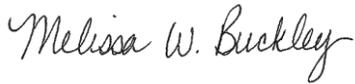

Mayor Boyd called the meeting to order. The Pledge was given and the Invocation was offered by Councilmember Hardy. Roll call was taken and Councilmembers Cake, Chacon and Schlesinger were absent. Motion: Moved by Councilmember Losey, seconded by Councilmember Soehner, to excuse the absent members. Motion passed unanimously.

COUNCIL CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE ACTION

A. Update from Navajo County Regarding Winslow Levee and Various Issues

Supervisor Jesse Thompson introduced Brian Kenny of the Army Corps of Engineers Los Angeles District, Homero Villa and Bill Best of Navajo County and Brandy Tomhave of the Tomhave Group. Supervisor Thompson referred to the many discussions with the City Council since the 1993 flood and stated that the Feasibility Study is near completion thanks to the partnering of the Winslow Levee Advisory Committee.

Homero Villa, Navajo County Assistant Manager, stated that he is happy to be able to share both the challenge and opportunity regarding the Winslow Levee. Brian Kenny, who is the project manager for the Winslow Feasibility Study, discussed the process that was followed to pick the Tentatively Selected Plan, which is the plan that will go before Congress when asking for the project to be authorized. Mr. Kenny thanked both Navajo County and the city for their assistance with this project. Brandy Tomhave explained that the Tomhave Group specializes in representing rural communities in Washington to get the authorizations (or appropriations) needed for critical

infrastructure projects. Mrs. Tomhave also discussed the work her firm has accomplished for the Winslow Levee project.

Mr. Villa showed an updated video concerning life safety issues associated with the Winslow Levee. Mr. Villa then presented a PowerPoint presentation regarding the Little Colorado River Flood Risk Management Feasibility Study and stated that the Board of Supervisors has approved the Tentatively Selected Plan and authorized their staff to work with city staff on sharing construction costs. The PowerPoint presentation included the scope of work for the Tentatively Selected Plan as well as cost estimates for the plan.

Mr. Villa stated that the Corps has a big interest in this project and will visit the Winslow Levee on April 14th. Future challenges of the project include the Design Agreement, which is expected to begin in early 2016 with an expected schedule of 2 - 4 years. The construction phase will begin after the design is complete and the current cost estimate is \$58,951,517 with a 35% local sponsor share of \$20,633.032.

Brian Kenny encouraged members of the Council to contact him and/or Mr. Villa to prepare for discussions with Brigadier General Toy and Colonel Colloton on April 14th.

Councilmember Soehner briefly commented on funding options for the city's portion of the project and the City Manager stated that annual funds in the amount of \$500,000 have been incorporated into the city's CIP for the levee project.

The City Manager stated that the State Shared Revenue list has been received from the League and discussed the impact that it will have on the budget. COUNCIL CONSIDERATION AND POSSIBLE ACTION

- A. Discussion and Possible Action Regarding Resolution No. 1692 Approving the IGA Between the State of Arizona and the City of Winslow Regarding Route 66 Renaissance Phase V, and Authorizing the Mayor to Execute the Agreement**

Sandy Phillips of Woodson Engineering explained that this project is a continuation of the Renaissance II project on Second & Third Street and extends from Berry to Prairie Avenues to the west and Williamson to Snider Avenues to the east. Ms. Phillips discussed the scope of work for the project and responded to questions from the Council. The City Manager also commented on the timeline for the project based on an e-mail that he received regarding relevant funding.

Motion: Moved by Councilmember Soehner, seconded by Councilmember Hardy, to pass Resolution No. 1692 approving the IGA between the State of Arizona and the City of Winslow for Route 66 Renaissance Phase V. Motion passed unanimously.

- B. Discussion and Possible Action Regarding Ordinance No. 1246 Amending a Portion of Section 2.22.030 of the Winslow Municipal Code**

The City Manager referred to the previous recommendation of the Arts Council to add two youth members to the council designating them as voting members and stated that since it has become increasingly difficult to get youth members to volunteer, it has become a problem to get a quorum for the meetings. The Arts Council, as well as staff, are recommending that the youth members be designated as ex-officio, non-voting members.

Motion: Moved by Councilmember Hardy, seconded by Councilmember Losey, to approve Ordinance No. 1246. Motion passed unanimously.

CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Mary Grayske spoke regarding an issue she is having with her water bill and requested that her late fee be waived. Mayor Boyd referred the matter to staff and the City Manager stated that he will schedule a meeting with Ms. Grayske to further discuss her issue.

The Librarian announced that the library will be closed from April 20th through May 2nd for interior painting.

Kenn Evans spoke regarding legislation concerning the use of drones within municipalities and requested that staff review the language of the proposed law to see if it would be applicable for use within our community. Mr. Evans also requested that the city consider making all 9-1-1 calls that are medical in nature as a non-public record for the privacy of our citizens.

The City Manager responded to a question from Councilmember Hardy regarding the flag at the 9/11 Memorial. The City Manager also discussed enforcement of the 15 MPH zone in the downtown area.
