Dear Ms. Kiefel:

The South Quincy Drainage & Levee District appreciates the opportunity to provide a Section 7001 Proposal in accordance with the Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2014. The attached proposal describes our proposed levee modification project.

In short, our levee system was first improved as part of the 1954 Flood Control Act. Further authorized improvements were made in 1987. We wish to improve our levee to the 500-year level of protection, to provide additional protection for our landowners and many commercial and industrial businesses. Our District area has experienced 18 major flood events since 1944. The cost of flood fighting and levee rehabilitation has led to our need to permanently improve our levee system. The proposed improvement would potentially reduce these costs that are typically compensated by FEMA or through the PL84-99 USACE program.

An improvement to our levee system and surrounding levee systems (as recommended by the Mississippi River Commission in the Upper Mississippi Comprehensive Plan) would increase protection to human health, and strengthen the local, regional, and national economies. Our District alone has prevented approximately \$3.44 billion in damages to infrastructure, property, and agriculture since 1973. If combined with the other Districts studied in the Comp Plan, the importance to our national economy becomes apparent.

Our District is willing to take on the expense for this project, but wish to have federal approval before proceeding. Again, we appreciate being able to submit this proposal and look forward to working with you in the future.

Non-Federal Interest: South Quincy Drainage & Levee District is the project sponsor and sole project contributor. However, other local, non-federal interests have contributed to this project previously.

Proposed Project: The proposed project is a modification to an existing United States Army Corps of Engineers project, the South Quincy Drainage & Levee District's levee. The levee was federally improved as a part of the 1954 Flood Control Act (House Document 281/83/2) and then improved a second time under House Document 99/167/2. The proposed project would improve the existing levee to reestablish an approximate 500-year design. The 500-year design would be sufficient to meet all requirements and retain FEMA certification, plus additional consideration due to uncertainties in climate change. This improvement would require additional sand and earthen material to raise the levee footprint. The levee would be improved on the landside of the levee, retaining its current riverside configuration. The project will include permitting work, assessment of environmental impacts, and right-of-way. This proposed improvement would be a frequency based design, meaning that if/when the flow frequency profiles were to change the levee could be modified to retain its 500-year level of protection, plus a critical levee freeboard of five (5) feet.

Project Purpose: The South Quincy Drainage & Levee District (District) is located in Adams County, along the east bank of the Mississippi River from River Mile 317.8 to 325.4. The South Quincy Drainage & Levee District was established in 1913. The District was established to protect the 6,406 acres of prime farmland, and aid in the reduction of waterborne disease. The original levees were improved as part of the 1954 Flood Control Act and the subsequent improvements of the 1950s and 1960s and the levees were improved a second time under House Document 99/167/2 in the 1980s.

The District's original levee improvement was based upon pre-1950s methodologies and datasets. Since that time, new data has become available and the new flood trends that have been experienced. The current data indicates that at the nearest gauge, since 1944, the odds of a flood event occurring that exceeds major flood stage are approximately 1 in 4 (~18 events). If this dataset is condensed to the past 10 years the odds jump to 1 in 2.5 (~4 events).

The District flood fights during significant flood events, like 1993 and 2008, by sandbagging where necessary. When the flooding subsides, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) funding may be applied for to cover flood fighting expenses. If flood damages occur, then the District would apply for funding from USACE under Public Law 84-99 for repairs. According to USACE MVR, the PL84-99 expenses for 2013 levee repairs were approximately \$2,345,000 (2013 costs). These damages do not include any FEMA or local expenses incurred for flood fighting, nor do they include damages to other infrastructure or farmland.

The South Quincy Drainage District provides a significant economic benefit to its surrounding region. It has been estimated by USACE MVR that the District has prevented approximately \$3,442,972,100 in damages since 1973. The levee protects critical aspects of the local economy, and if lumped together with the other Districts that need improvements in this region, can sum to significant regional or even national economic impact. South Quincy has been selected for a new Mid-America Intermodal Authority Port project along M-35, with funding for design provided by the State of Illinois.

The proposed project is within the recommendations of the Mississippi River Commission's (MRC) for the Upper Mississippi River Comprehensive Plan UMRCP), dated August 14, 2008.

Project Estimate: Approximately \$8,800,000, which includes permitting, engineering, and construction activities.

Project Benefits: The population located behind this levee is approximately 250 inhabitants. The proposed project would not only protect this population, but also protect approximately 6.6 miles of State and County Highways, 5.3 miles of railroads, significant industrial/commercial development, and residences. The proposed project would provide additional protection for human health and these roadways, railways, and businesses beyond the existing estimated annual damages prevented of approximately \$86 million (value estimated from USACE MVR calculations).

This District is a portion of the Upper Mississippi River Basin Levee System, which was found to provide direct or indirect protection to major roadway and railway bridges that cross the Mississippi or Illinois Rivers. A study entitled *Detour and Transportation Infrastructure Costs Due to a Major Flood Event on the Upper Mississippi and Illinois Rivers* by the Center for Transportation Research at the University of Tennessee found that the total costs of detour, road damage, and highway damage due to a major flood event was \$1.027 billion. This District provides a portion of this transportation benefit.

Project Support: The District's Board supports this project and other levee and drainage districts in the surrounding area are supportive and seeking their own improvements, in accordance with the UMRCP.

Project Cost Share: No federal cost share required. Project planned at 100% local sponsor cost. However, if funding is made available under the National Levee Safety Act (Title IX of WRDA 2007), the Comprehensive Plan (Section 459 of WRDA 1999), or other USACE funding, it would be of great assistance to improve public health and safety for the Upper Mississippi River.






On behalf of the County of Adams, Illinois, the Adams County Highway Department and the Township of Melrose in Adams County, Illinois, we send this letter of support for the South Quincy Drainage and Levee District's proposal in accordance with the Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2014.

The South Quincy Drainage and Levee District was formed in 1944 and has since experienced 18 major Mississippi River flood events to date. Major improvements have been made to the levee system in 1954 and again in 1987, but those improvements have not been enough to provide the level of protection needed. Improvements to the levee system to bring it to the 500-year flood event would provide the much needed protection for the existing industries, commercial businesses and the agricultural land within the District. An upgrade to a 500-year levee would also provide protection for the public infrastructure within the District which includes not only the road network, but also a County owned rail spur and municipal sanitary and water systems.


